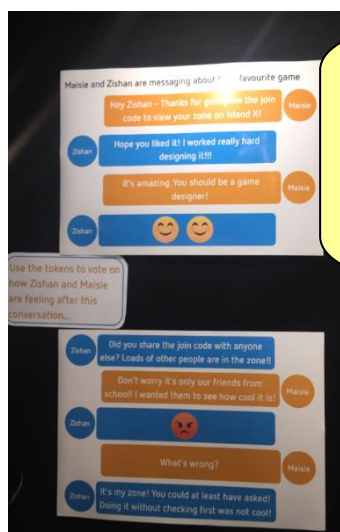


## Digital Leaders at Safer Internet Day 2019



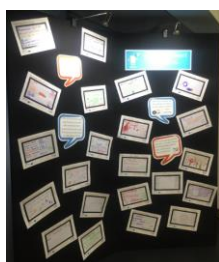

They also took part in a range of workshops led by *Childnet* and listened to key-note speakers; leaders from technology companies and MPs talk about the future of E-safety in the UK. They had a fantastic day and made an excellent contribution to the event.

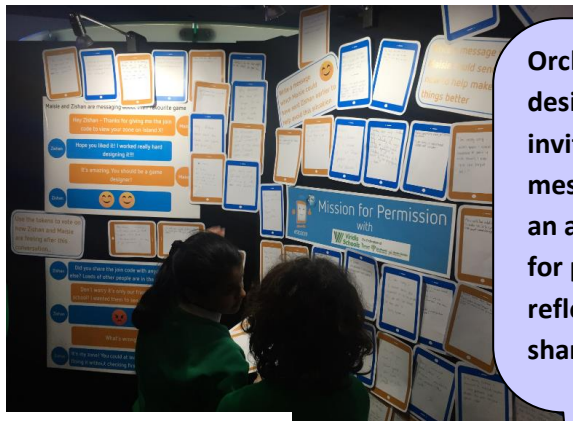


## True or False?

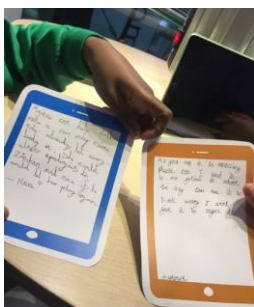
- You don't need to ask permission to upload a photo of a friend on social media.
