Halving Objects:

When we halve something we split it into two equal groups!

For this activity you will need:

- 10 or more small objects to count (e.g. cubes, pebbles)
- 2 bowls

Task:



1. Start by counting out 10 objects
2. Can you split the objects evenly into two bowls? You can say "one for me, one for you" as you do it, to help you share them equally!
3. Can you count how many objects are in **one** bowl? This is half!
4. Can you record your calculation? You might want to draw a picture of your bowls, and draw dots for the objects inside.
5. Can you explore finding half of 2, 4, 6 and 8 objects?
6. Can you find half of 9 objects? What do you notice?

Can you work out the missing number?




Some other ideas for halving at home:



- *Explore cutting food in half, e.g. fruit, pizza or cakes*
