Strategies to help you learn your spellings:

Look, Cover, Write	Words within Words
This is a repetitive strategy of looking at the word first to really see the word,	Words can be easier to spell if smaller words are found inside larger words.
look at the shape, visualise it. To then say the word. Next to cover the word and finally write it. Children must check and correct mistakes.	Example: for-ever, inte-rest-ting.

Sounding Out The Word	Mnemonics
Sound the word out little by little. If it sounds wrong, try changing the vowel	Make a phrase or sentence up about a word that you have difficulty spelling.
sound from long to short or vice versa.	Example: because = big elephants can always understand small elephants
